A Real Downtown for Kenmore? Come and See.

If you haven't been to the corner of 68th Avenue NE and NE 181st Street in a while, you should stop by and take a look. MainStreet Property Group LLC is investing heavily in two large developments: Spencer68 Apartments and the LINQ at Spencer Square. Both of these developments are on the Kenmore Village property (sold by the City to MainStreet), and when completed, these two developments will represent more than \$75 million in new private sector investment in the heart of our downtown.

If you combine other private and public sector investments in recent years (Kenmore Camera, new library, city hall, skate court, and town green), total new investment in our downtown exceeds \$100 million—all within one block of the 68th/181st intersection.

In the LINQ building, MainStreet's tenant on the 20,000 square foot main floor will be EvergreenHealth. Approximately 90 residential units are under construction on the upper four floors of the LINQ. Completion of the LINQ is anticipated in the first half of 2017.

The City's town green and community building (NW corner of 68th Avenue NE and NE 181st Street) continue to take shape and are expected to be completed sometime this fall. The retail portion of the community building is expected to be ready in the first half of 2017.



While creating and building Kenmore's own sense of "downtown place" is a work in progress, significant steps and milestones have been achieved. Soon after Kenmore incorporated as a City in 1998, many citizens worked tirelessly on writing a downtown plan. Key elements in that plan are now coming together, and their vision for Kenmore's very own downtown is becoming a reality.

Major Milestones Accomplished on SR 522 Improvement Project



Recent construction milestones of the SR 522 West A Improvement Project include the reopening of 61st Ave NE between SR 522 and NE 175th Street (left) and the removal of old overhead utility lines (right).

The construction team is making great progress on the SR 522 West A Improvement Project. The project is on track to be completed this fall.

On April 20, 61st Ave NE between NE 175th Street and SR 522 reopened to people walking, biking, and driving. We appreciate everyone's patience with the detours as the construction team built two retaining walls, installed a culvert pipe to channel the stream, fully graded the road, built a new

sidewalk, installed a new traffic signal, and improved the Burke-Gilman Trail crossing.

In early April, crews also flipped the switch on the new traffic signal at the intersection of SR 522 and 61st Ave NE, completed restriping of 61st Ave NE, and completed the removal of old overhead utility lines in the project area.

The next phase of work includes paving driveways along the south side of SR 522 and raised center median

work. During the median work, the bus lanes on both sides of SR 522 will be temporarily used as general purpose lanes. The lane shift is anticipated to last until summer. The center turn lane will be permanently replaced with a median to help increase safety and aesthetics of the area.

Your Property Taxes

I'll be the first to admit that property taxes aren't the easiest thing to wrap your head around. The relationship between the assessed value of your property, your property tax rate, and the actual amount you pay can be confusing. In addition, there are property tax rates assessed by different taxing jurisdictions, and they combine to create the total rate you pay in property taxes.

In Kenmore, that total property tax rate for 2016 is \$11.580 per \$1,000 of the assessed value of your property, \$1.258 of which is the City of Kenmore portion. So if you own a \$500,000 home, you will pay \$5,790 in total property taxes this year. Of that amount, \$629 will go to the City of Kenmore.

Kenmore's \$1.258 portion of the total property tax rate will generate about \$4.5 million in 2016. As a point of reference, the City's 2016 public safety expenditures (police, jail, and justice services) are budgeted at just over \$4 million.

Just under 11% of your property taxes go to the City of Kenmore. The remaining 89% of your property taxes go to other taxing jurisdictions, including the State of Washington, King County, Northshore School District, King County Library District, Northshore Fire District, King County Flood Control District, Port of Seattle, among others.

Here are some common questions and answers about property tax:

If the value of my property goes up by 20% this year, will I see a 20% increase in my property taxes next year?


Most likely no, but it depends. The total amount jurisdictions can collect for all property owners can only go up by 1% per year.* If your increase in property value is equal to the average increase in value for other properties in the taxing jurisdiction, then your property tax increase should not exceed one-percent. But the average increase in property values varies by jurisdiction (State, County, City, etc.). See why I said it was confusing?

If the total amount collected by jurisdictions can't increase by more than 1% per year, then why do my property taxes paid go up by more than 1%?

If you are seeing an annual increase of more than one percent, there may be at least two possible reasons for it:

- Voter approved property tax increases aren't subject to the 1% limit.

- The increase in value of your particular property may exceed the average increase in value of the other properties in your jurisdiction.

If I disagree with the County Assessor's valuation of my property, can I contest it?


Yes. Call the King County Assessor at 206-296-7300 or email Assessor.Info@kingcounty.gov. You can request that the data on your property be reviewed or explained by an appraiser and an Assessment Review can be initiated. Appeal procedures can be found at the King County Assessor's website.

Can senior citizens and/or lower income residents receive assistance in paying their property taxes?

Yes. King County offers two types of tax relief for people 60 and older. For more information, go to the King County Assessor's website, click on Common Questions, then click on Seniors. Or, call 206-396-3920. In addition to assistance for seniors, partial property tax deferrals are available for people under a certain income threshold. Call the same number or click on Residential under Common Questions on the Assessor's website.

*New construction is not included in the calculation of the 1% increase limit. Voter-approved property tax increases are not subject to the 1% increase limit. Some jurisdictions may have "banked capacity" whereby they may increase property taxes by more than 1% if they have not taken the 1% increase in prior years (up to the limits of the prior years).

Sidewalk Under Construction along NE 181st Street



On April 25, the City started construction of a new sidewalk along the south side of NE 181st Street between 68th and 73rd Avenues NE. The project includes several benefits to the community, including:

- Improved safety and accessibility due to added sidewalks and lighting;
- Improved corridor appearance due to undergrounding of utility lines and

added landscaping;

- Water main upgrades by Northshore Utility District.

Funding partners on the south sidewalk project include the City of Kenmore, Puget Sound Regional Council's Transportation Alternatives Program and United States Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant

Program. Construction is anticipated to last through the summer.

The City is also planning to install sidewalk along the north side of the NE 181st Street between 68th and 73rd Avenues NE. Construction is anticipated to begin in early 2017.

A big THANK YOU to the hundreds of residents who provided input on potential transportation and park projects during the Imagine Kenmore process.

Imagine Kenmore was aimed at discovering what's important to our citizens in both transportation safety and park improvements. Because of the very helpful feedback from the community, the City Council has been able to distill all of the information and input into a proposed list of projects that reflect the priorities communicated during Imagine Kenmore.

Known as "Walkways and Waterways," the preliminary list of projects that may move forward for Kenmore voter approval in November are:

- New sidewalks and bike lanes on Juanita Drive and 68th Avenue NE, from the southern city limits to the northern city limits
- Beach improvements as well as new paths at Log Boom Park.
- Boardwalk Trail at Rhododendron Park, connecting the playfield to the river.
- Waterfront access improvements and new paths and trails at Squire's Landing Park.

At the May 23, 2016 meeting, the City Council will consider a resolution to include a property tax bond measure on the November 2016 ballot to pay for these projects.



Pet License Community Outreach and Education Program Underway

Starting April 30, staff from Regional Animal Services of King County (RASKC) will be visiting neighborhoods in north Kenmore on weekends to inform residents about the benefits of pet licensing and to ensure that pets are properly licensed. Canvassing was conducted in areas of south Kenmore last year. All cats and dogs eight weeks or older in the RASKC service area are required to be licensed with King County.



If a representative finds an unlicensed pet, they will not issue a citation. Instead, they will provide a free temporary license, which provides pet owners time to purchase a permanent license.

King County pet licensing representatives are easily recognized by their King County ID badges, RASKC logo shirts or jackets, business cards, and pet licensing documents. As King County employees, they follow strict guidelines regarding professional conduct. Staff will not peer in windows or over fences looking for pets.

Pet licenses protect pets and help sustain vital animal care and control services, such as reuniting owners with their lost pets, including providing licensed pets a free ride home; adopting pets by supporting care at both of King County's pet adoption centers; responding to reports of dangerous or nuisance animals; and investigating and prosecuting cases of animal cruelty or neglect.

Neighborhood Projects Underway as a Result of Community Meetings

The Neighborhood Transportation Plan program is continuing into 2016. The program gathers citizens from each of 15 neighborhoods across Kenmore to discuss concerns, priorities and solutions on residential public roads in the City. Using this feedback, a planned projects map is developed for each participating neighborhood. Each neighborhood is allocated a budget based on the number of households to implement these projects.

Two groups of neighborhoods, Group A and B, met in the fall and winter of 2015 to identify concerns and brainstorm possible solutions. The completed maps for Group A and B neighborhoods have been approved by the citizens that helped to develop them. Each neighborhood had between eight and 12 projects evaluated, ranging from stop signs and speed limit signs to fog line striping, speed feedback signs, arterial crosswalks with RRFBs and LED street lighting upgrades. Many projects in these neighborhoods are being implemented in the spring and summer of 2016.

The Group C neighborhoods held their first meetings in March and second meetings will occur the first week of May. You can check the meeting schedule and find your neighborhood at www.kenmorewa.gov/ntpp. The final plans and project implementation for these neighborhoods will occur in the summer and fall of 2016.

Vegetation Maintenance Reminder

Please help us by checking your vegetation and trimming where necessary. This is especially important if you have sidewalk or walkways in front of your property, or if you live at an intersection. At intersections, it's important to make sure drivers can see approaching traffic.
